



Justice Corner

The past weeks have provided us with three Sequences or poems for the feasts of Easter, Pentecost and Corpus Christi. These are ancient poems of praise, like the Psalms that we sing after the first Reading, honoring God who gives us so much. Praising God is one of the main marks of the character we have as people of Jesus Christ. Jesus often gave praise and thanks to the Father and taught us to do so in the Lord's Prayer: "Hallowed be Thy name." The Sequence for today says,

"Full and clear ring out your chanting, Joy nor sweetest grace be wanting, From your heart let praises burst.

This is easy to do in times of gladness, but harder to do when troubles arise. Pope Francis gives us a clue as to how to do this in times of sadness and difficulty. He asks us in *Joy of the Gospel* to renew our personal encounter with Christ each day. "Now is the time to say to Jesus: 'Lord, I have let myself be deceived; in a thousand ways I have shunned your love, yet I am here once more, to renew my covenant with you. I need you. Save me once again, Lord, take me once more into your redeeming embrace...No one can strip us of the dignity bestowed upon us by this boundless and unfailing love." It is this embrace which enables us to be joyful in the midst of sorrow. We feel this embrace each time we approach the altar and receive Christ in communion.

Recently I read a poem by Barbara Holmes (1) which illustrates "Joy Unspeakable" in the midst of sorrow. It is a poem about the hardships of the African American community and recounts the horrible history of those who were forcibly taken from their homeland and families and brought to this country under terrible conditions.

Joy Unspeakable is not silent, it moans and hums and bends to the rhythm of the dancing universe... Joy Unspeakable is practicing freedom while chains still chafe...(it) dares us to play and pray in the interstices of life...

Joy Unspeakable is a symphony of incongruities of faces aglow and hearts on fire and the wonder of surviving together."

When I worked in the African American Church, I learned from them how to sing in the midst of bodily weariness from fighting injustice, "I don't feel no ways tired." I learned that we have "Blessed Assurance" of God's love. This is what we celebrate on Corpus Christi. We are together in Christ moaning and humming and playing in a world full of sorrows and disappointments. In the midst of school shootings and betrayals of government officials, car wrecks and disasters, we practice the freedom of the children of God because He so loved us that He gave us His only begotten Son. So this week, "From your heart let praises burst" every time you enjoy a sunset or receive a moment of trust from a friend, every time you have a quiet moment or rejoice together as a family.

Practicing the Art of Sacred Listening Reflection 1: Qualities of Deep Listening – Listening for Essence

"Perhaps the most precious and powerful gift we can give another person is to really listen to them, to listen with quiet, fascinated attention, with our whole being fully present.

Listening is a creative force. Something quite wonderful occurs when we are listened to fully. We expand, ideas come to life and grow, we remember who we are.

The way we listen can actually allow the other person to bring forth what is true and alive to them. Sometimes we have to do a lot of listening before the fountain is replenished. Have you ever noticed some people seem to need to talk? This is often because they have not been fully listened to. Patience is required to listen to such a person long enough for them to get to their center point of tranquility and peace.

Listening well takes time, skill and a readiness to slow down, to let go of expectations, judgments, boredom, self-assertiveness, defensiveness."
